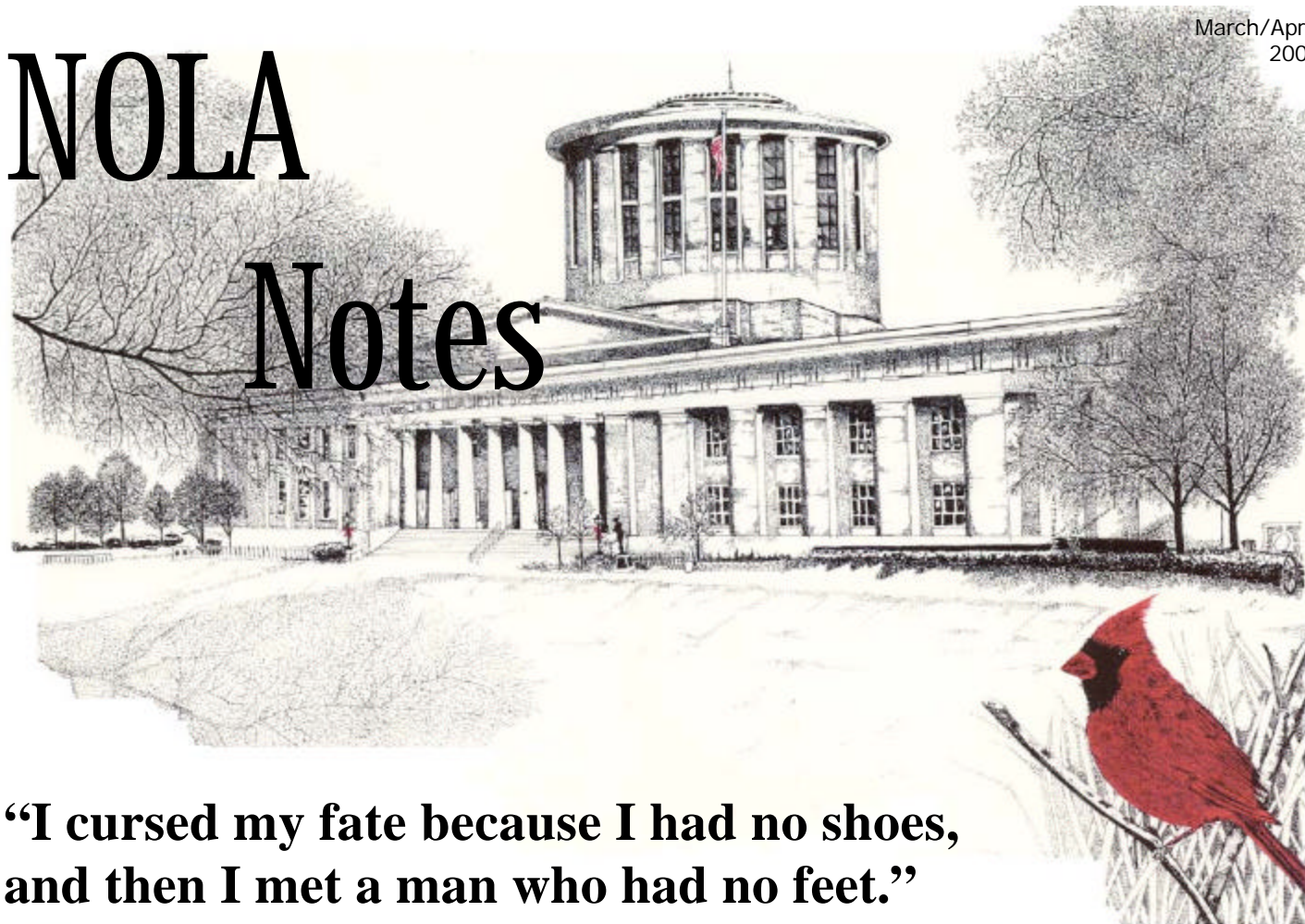


# NOLA Notes

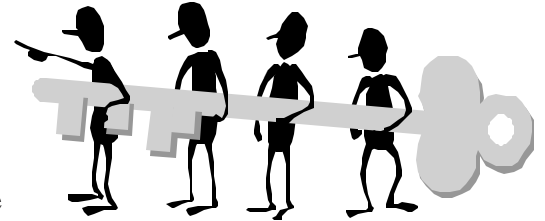

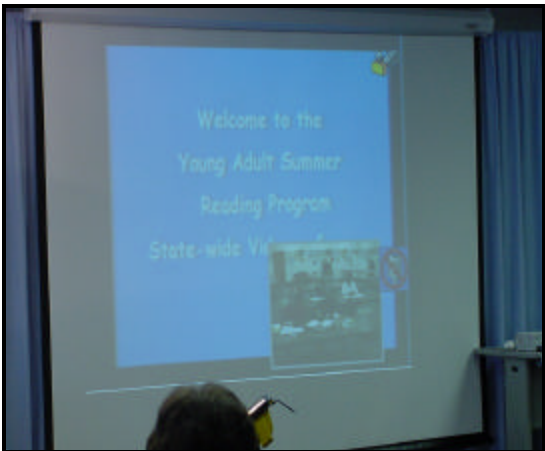

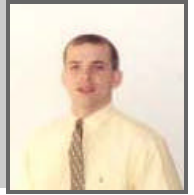

# TECHNOLOGY SERVICES

## Technology on a Tight Budget

As the funds available to libraries continue to be reduced, technology staff frequently have to keep older machines in service longer or continue running older versions of software products since upgrades aren't in the budget. Below are a number of ideas for those of you looking to cut costs, without losing too much in performance.

1. Consider buying refurbished or used equipment with warranties. While I'd certainly recommend buying new equipment with a full warranty if you can afford it, as budgets get tighter libraries may have to look more and more at buying refurbished or used items. If you do think about used equipment be sure to investigate the seller carefully and understand what if any warranty coverage you can expect. Also you may want to stay away from refurbished items with lots of moving parts.
2. Don't forget that memory upgrades are inexpensive and can usually extend the useful life of a PC significantly.
3. Be sure to maintain your PC's by running things like defrag regularly and keep the number of applications running at startup to a minimum as these offer no real benefit but do consume processor and memory.
4. Re-task PC's when possible instead of getting rid of them. Often times older PC's can still fill some need in your library and may help you to save money later on down the road.
5. Be sure that you are buying or at least checking state term prices for equipment and software. Don't forget that many vendors offer deep discounts to state agencies, be sure to investigate these as you try to stretch your budget dollar further. Also be sure to check out NOLA's vendor discount catalog for additional discounts.
6. If you do buy new PC's, try to remove un-needed components from the systems such as modems or unnecessary software. If you're buying a Windows server be sure to buy it with NO operating system and then purchase the operating system under the state contract. This little trick can save you more than \$500!
7. Be sure to look at free or low cost software alternatives, especially for system administration tasks that don't impact end users. There are low costs alternatives for almost anything that you might need to do as a system admin.
8. Don't settle for the first quote, remember you can ask for a better price. Be sure to shop around and let your vendor know that you're shopping for the best price, you may be surprised by the results!

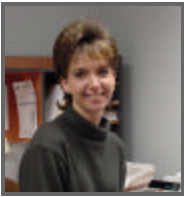

## **Are you ready to be HIPAAatized?**

When we count to three, you will understand everything you need to know about the HIPAA Privacy Rule. One.... ## **NOLA awarded LSTA Mini Grant**

At the March 27 State Library of Ohio Board meeting in Columbus, NOLA Regional Library System was awarded a LSTA Mini Grant in the amount of \$22,794 to develop an online collection of library continuing education programs using streaming video. This project, ***Reaching Out Through Technology***, will provide for the development of an online collection of library-specific continuing education programs containing at least 40 hours of streaming video instruction and related training materials available on demand from any workstation capable of accessing the Internet. The availability of on demand access to training materials via the Internet will allow libraries to attend training sessions without the limitations imposed by geography and/or scheduling. The training programs offered will feature content designed for administrative, reference/public services, youth services, and technology library staff members, as well as courses designed for libraries to use for patron education and programming.

### **Mobile Video Conferencing System**

NOLA will purchase a mobile video conferencing system to be used by the 95% of the libraries throughout the region who lack their own video conferencing equipment. This system will allow libraries to provide public programming and staff training via videoconference.

## **News around NOLA**

The NOLA Regional Library System would also like to congratulate two NOLA members who received LSTA Mini Grants as well. John F. Kennedy High School received \$7,027 for the purchase of eight PC workstations and a printer. The Media Specialist will provide teachers with one-on-one training and assist them in incorporating research assignments and projects with media center resources. Students will be instructed through English classes.

McKinley Memorial Library received \$23,684 to establish a computer lab consisting of eight computers, an instructor's workstation, and LCD projector. The lab is part of the library's building expansion project.

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### **Mentor Public Library**

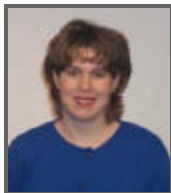
Mentor Municipal Court Judge John Trebetts and Mentor Public Library's Executive Director, Dale Craig, entered into a cooperative arrangement in which the Judge would offer as an alternative to 2 days of community service, a defendant in his court could donate \$100.00 to the Mentor Public Library. They started this cooperative project last Thursday and on February 24, 2003, the Library had its first \$100.00 check. The Library will add these funds to its growing Endowment Fund. The idea came from Judge Trebetts, who along with Mr. Craig, is a member of the Mentor Rotary Club.

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**Congratulations** to Dave Blankenship of Reed Memorial Library. Last weekend, Dave was the top over-age 50 finisher in the USATF National Men's 10 Mile Championship held in Louisville, KY. He ran 58:33 on a fairly hilly course.

This course will review and explore on-line medical information sources for personal information. Emphasis will be placed on the evaluation of resources for currency, accuracy, and authoritativeness. You may receive one credit hour towards Belmont Technical College's Information Services: Library Paraprofessional Associate degree. The comparable course at Belmont is INF224 Information Services Special Topic Course: Medical Resources on the Internet. If you choose the one credit hour you will be required to participate in an additional 16 hours of web-based activities.

**Planning for Results: April 29, 2003 at Hilton Garden Inn, Twinsburg. Speakers: Cindy Lombardo, and Wayne Piper,** Planning for results instructors  
This interactive workshop will provide an introduction to

the Public Library Association's strategic planning model, New Planning for Results. The fundamental premises of this innovative model will be introduced including the basic assumptions and steps involved in the process, the concept of community based planning and the development of a community vision. The role of a facilitator in the process, the library's selection of service responses, the creation of goals and objectives, and the reallocation of resources to meet the stated goals and objectives will also be thoroughly examined.

### Age Matters: June 4, 2003 at Warren Trumbull County Public Library

#### Speakers: Mary V. Merrill and Jane B. Federer

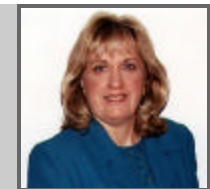

#### **Follett Media Merges with Book Wholesalers Inc.**

The Follett Library and School Group has announced that Follett Media Distribution (FMD), which is located in Crystal Lake, Illinois, will become part of BWI and will move its operations to BWI's facility in Lexington, Kentucky. BWI, which is one of the nation's largest distributors of children's and young adult titles to public libraries, and FMD, which is a fast-growing distributor of video, DVD, CD-ROM, audiobooks, and music compact discs to public libraries, are both divisions within the Library and School Group of Follett Corporation.

#### **Harry Potter News**

As everyone knows by now, *Harry Potter and the Order of the Phoenix* is being published on June 21, 2003. For the first time, the Reinforced Library Binding edition of the book will be published simultaneously with the regular trade edition. The reinforced edition should endure multiple circulations in public and school libraries.

The ISBN for the Reinforced Library Binding edition is: 0-439-56761-0. It will be the same trim size (6" x 9") and page count (approximately 896 pages) as the trade edition. It will be available through the same sales channels as the regular trade edition.

*Harry Potter and the Order of the Phoenix* will be released later in an audio version to be produced by Listening Library.

#### **Another Celebrity as Author – Make that Madonna!**

Madonna has signed on with Calloway Editions to write a five-volume series of bedtime stories (for the six-and-over set) each to be illustrated by a different, celebrated illustrator. Publisher will be Penguin Books. The first book in the series, *The English Roses*, is planned for a September release in hardcover.

#### **Maisy on PBS**

Maisy is a huge star on PBS these days. Here are two new books about her character by author Lucy Cousins. *Maisy Loves You* (ISBN 0763620653, BD \$5.99 list) came out in February, *Maisy's Best Friends* (ISBN 0763621285, BD \$5.99 list), is due in May.

This fall, Simon and Schuster will be launching a new Spanish language imprint: Libros Para Ninos.
