The Ohio Senate Now Considering Budget Bill

The Ohio House of Representatives passed a budget (Substitute Bill 283) on May 6, 1999, that includes \$1,871,151 in funding for the seven Regional Library Systems (RLS) in Ohio for FY 2000 and \$1,926,769 for FY2001.

This amount was recommended to the House Finance Committee by the Primary and Secondary Education Subcommittee that is chaired by Kerry Metzger, Representative of the 97th District (New Philadelphia). This level of funding represents 90% of the combined state and federal (Library Services and Technology Act) dollars distributed to the seven Regionals during FY1999.

Beginning July 1, 1999 LSTA funding is only to be used as seed money for special library projects in Ohio. Therefore the Regional Library Systems requested increased state funding for basic administrative costs and to provide various services to member libraries.

Some of these services include the following:

- library development continuing education;
- technology continuing education;
- technology assistance;
- cooperative activities.

NOLA libraries have written letters of support to their legislators and members of both the House Finance Committee and the Senate Finance Committees.

On May 18, 1999, the Senate Finance Committee, Chaired by Senator Roy Ray from the 27th District (Akron), will hear testimony from Michael Lucas pertaining to the State Library of Ohio's budget.

Stephen Hedges, the Director of the Nelsonville Public Library, will speak on behalf of increased state funding for RLS. His library is a member of the Ohio Valley Area Libraries (OVAL), located in Wellston. He will ask the Committee to support the same level of funding for Regional Li-

brary Systems in its budget as found in the House budget: **\$1,871,151 for FY2000.**

It is expected that the full Senate will pass a budget by mid-June. Any differences between the House and Senate budgets will be resolved by a joint conference committee. Then the Governor will sign a budget bill no later than June 30, 1999.

As soon as NOLA receives information about the Senate Finance Committee's recommendations, we will notify members. The July/August issue of NOLA Notes will contain information about the budget signed into law by the Governor and the funding that is included for NOLA Regional Library System and the other six RLS.

We want to thank all member libraries for their continued support. If you have any questions regarding the upcoming budget passage or the future of NOLA funding, please don't hesi-

RefLinks...Turning Frustration into Solutions!

Reference librarians have a reputation. When they tackle a problem they come up with a solution.

That was the springboard for NOLA's exciting RefLinks project, begun by a handful of reference librarians who sought the same quality reference service on the internet as they found in traditional reference sources in their libraries.

Of course, there were readily available search engines or indexes where they could get thousands of hits on any given subject. As Karen Mateer (Kinsman) says, "Quantity was never a problem on the internet." What they needed was an organized quality computerized library for librarians.

That's when Karen, Sara Eklund Payne (Painesville Morley) and Jeanne Wisniewski (McKinley Memorial) met and devised a plan. What resulted from their frustration was the Ohio RefLinks Project. Joining them in their quest for ultimate internet reference service are Bethany Peltz (Tuscarawus Public) and Leslie Pallotta (McKinley Memorial).

First thing on the agenda was setting criteria for judging a web site. Adopting the same basic principles used for selecting materials for their collections, the group added 10 additional

values: authority, audience, accuracy, currency, scope, uniqueness, format/appearance, searchability, and help for visitors.

With selection guidelines accomplished, the next decision involved how to arrange the sites. The Dewey Decimal System was the easiest and most logical choice for public librarians. And, so they set out to catalog the web...as far as the Dewey 100's!

The site was designed so that the library patrons see the broad Dewey subject headings on the home page. Once leaving the home page, the Dewey categories are the given numbers all reference librarians use in addition to the subject headings. Sites deemed worthy of inclusion may be assigned multiple subject headings as well as multiple Dewey classification. Librarians can go straight to the number or search the site's intuitive search engine to locate information.

The 1500-plus "links" that make up the RefLinks site are checked on a regular basis to assure that quality is maintained. The RefLinks team meets monthly at NOLA headquarters to add sites, exchange information, and continue charting their course to accurate information for all.

The Future of Video Conferencing at NOLA

Many of you have seen and/or experienced the delivery of low quality video via the Internet. This video tends to be grainy, slow, and generally of poor quality. While this low quality video is relatively easy to configure and inexpensive, it lacks the quality needed to be useful for most professional environments.

The delivery of broadcast quality video via the Internet has for years offered a great deal of possibility, but has not been widely implemented due to high cost, complexity and a lack of reliability. During the past six to twelve months, the costs have dropped, more advanced and easier to use systems have been developed and transmission reliability

has been greatly improved. Based upon these changes, NOLA has begun investigating the development and implementation of a high-speed broadcast-quality video conferencing system that can provide an exceptional learning experience for all participants.

The video conferencing system that NOLA is planning to implement will make use of multiple video cameras, a number of 32" or larger displays, instructor and participant microphones, overhead projectors and much more. This system will be part of a collaborative effort between all of Ohio's Regional Library Systems that will provide an eight-site system with sites throughout Ohio, to include sites in: Cleveland,

Columbus and Cincinnati. Once this network of sites is completed, NOLA will be able to provide members with broadcast-quality remote access to meetings and programs presented at locations throughout the state and beyond. Additionally, due to the availability of high-speed connections in most member libraries and because this system is portable and is based on open standards, (TCP/IP and H.323) NOLA will be able to make this resource available for use in member libraries.

Be sure to watch the NOLA Desktop for more information this summer and be ready for NOLA's first video conferencing opportunities coming early next year!

Babies, Brains, & Libraries

In the last two years, there has been much information released on new brain research that stresses the importance of a baby's first three years. Babies' intelligence is not just genetically determined - the brain is also affected by environment. The kind of nourishment, care, surroundings, and stimulation that a baby receives is crucial to his/her brain development.

Connections between neurons (brain cells) which are called synapses are vital for healthy brain development. The first three years of life are when the vast majority of synapses are produced. Both positive and negative experiences have a decisive impact on how the brain is wired in these first three years.

What types of positive stimulation causes synapses to form? Sharing language and music with babies are just two examples - but two very positive experiences! Thus, parents of newborns should be encouraged to share language through nursery rhymes or books and also music with their infant daily.

Libraries can play an important role in modeling to parents the sharing of language and music with babies through lapsits or babytime programs.

Cooperatively produced, the 30-second television spots were run at the rate of 40 per day, and, over the course of the month of April, appeared on 25 different channels!

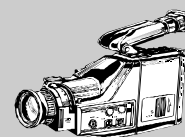
The two commercials—one featuring adult services and the other, with a children's theme—were a cooperative effort of the seven Trumbull County libraries: Bristol, Girard, Hubbard, Kinsman, Newton Falls, Niles, and Warren/Trumbull County.

Hubbard Public Library had chalked up success with an earlier National Library Week spot and was interested in doing an overall promotion. Ruth Mizik, Director, envisioned a cooperative effort, and all seven Trumbull County libraries were soon united in a joint effort with Ruth, Jan Vaughn of Warren/Trumbull County, and Pat Finan of Niles McKinley, as the production committee.

All three came up with a list of suggested visuals. Jan wrote the scripts, and TCI Media Services did the rest. There were no production costs incurred by the seven libraries, but airtime costs were shared on a pro-rated basis.

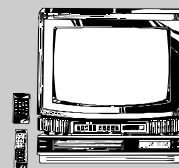

Prescription Drug Changes

When NOLA renewed its contract with Anthem, there were some prescription drug changes that are very important to note. A brochure for the addition of a Formulary Drug Component has been provided to our members, but you may not have noticed some distinct changes.

Due to the increasing costs of prescription drugs, Anthem revised all of the prescription drug components. The plan encourages the most effective prescription and use of medications by your employees.

The employees will pay a lower co-payment when the prescribed medication is in the

formulary. The formulary changes daily and therefore will not show up in print.

Please advise your employees to speak with their doctors. Mark Nolan of the Herbruck, Alder & Company informed me that the doctors have access to the Anthem formulary and can prescribe a lower cost medication, but the employee needs to bring the formulary component to their doctors attention.
