Ghosts From Halloween Past... Living in the Present... at Sutliff Museum!

Darkness falls across the city of Warren. In the black of night, you see someone with a lantern approaching the library, followed by a silent crowd of 50 people. Are they coming to take "Heather Has Two Mommies" from the shelf? Are they staging a protest concerning the lack of parking at the library? No, they're on the Ghost Walk of Warren, stopping at the Warren-Trumbull County Public Library to hear a spine-tingling tale from the past!

Ghost Walk is a long-standing fundraising event produced by the Fine Arts Council of Trumbull County, the Trumbull Historical Society, and actors from the Trumbull New Theater group. Last year, it attracted over 2,600 people during its limited run. Altogether, the guided tour groups visit some seven or eight "haunted" stops along the route through Warren's downtown historic district. As the brochure states, "Walk with us...and discover...the spirits of Warren never sleep!"

In 1998, the Warren-Trumbull County Public Library signed on as a Ghost Walk stop. But what could be an appropriate story? The library facility was built in 1971 and no untoward occurrences had happened there..yet. But, there was the Sutliff Museum, located upstairs!

The Sutliff Museum was funded by the estate of Phebe Sutliff in honor of her parents, who helped to establish the Warren Public Library at the turn of the century. The museum is on the library's second floor, and offers a peek back into the Victorian past of Trumbull County. Phebe could certainly come out of the museum, float downstairs, and tell a tale to the Ghost Walk participants huddled outside the library's entrance!

And, that's just what will happen again on October 15, 16, 17 (Sunday matinee), 22 and 23 when the wind moans and the bat's on the wing. Phebe, who died in 1955, will share a tale or two from her mother, Phebe Marvin Sutliff. When Mrs. Sutliff was a little girl, Warren was still a wild and woolly place, with danger at every turn! Her tale involves...but why spoil it for you? You'll want to come yourself to take the Ghost Walk tour. Visit the city's beautiful historic city hall and meet the ghost who can't quite get over her nephew's untimely death. Chill to the tale of the county's first - and only - public execution. And, meet the widow who misses her husband so much that she sleeps on his grave in Pioneer Cemetery!

NOLA Technology Group Moves Ahead of the "Game"

I'd like to let NOLA membership know about some of the great work going on in some our member libraries. Andrew Davis – Kinsman, Charlie Voelker – Morley, Jeanne Wisniewski – McKinley and Kathy Kendall – Mentor at all part of the NOLA PERL Group – which is comprised of technologists from member libraries who are interested in exploring and developing advanced web technologies. For those not familiar with PERL, it is an extremely powerful computer programming language. It is used to databases to the web, connect data with forms, and many other advanced web applications. It is often used to create advanced web sites with dynamic page generation, database linkage, data collection forms and other advanced web technologies.

The members of this group have recently completed their first major web application – a web-based trivia game for use by libraries. The program provides patrons with a fun and challenging interactive experience while helping them to learn a bit about the subject of the game (possible subjects include American Indian History, 60's Pop Culture, and Current Events). Due of the terrific work of the group, adding new trivia games is easy, even for non-technical staff. With less than one hour of training, most users can create new games as quickly as they can write the questions and answers.

This program is currently being used at Mentor Public Library to ask visitors some tough musical trivia questions (you can visit the site at <http://www.mentor.lib.oh.us/trivia.html>). Three Basic Functions of a Board of Trustees

In the crush to keep up with the actual work of a Board, too few Board members stop to think about what the basic functions of a non-profit board member are-a failure that often leads to conflicts with staff because of possible inappropriate board intervention.

The three basic "bedrock" functions of any non-profit Board:

1. *Establish Purpose, Mission & Goals*

The purpose tells why the organization exists and what ultimate result is expected. The mission is derived from the purpose and tells what the organization will do in order to achieve it. Mission-related goals are a breakdown of the mission statement into more specific and manageable units. Defining results - that is, the purpose, mission and goals - is the responsibility of the Board; developing and implementing methods to achieve those results is primarily the responsibility of the Library Director and their staff.

2. *Ensure Success*

The Board assigns accountability and then monitors and evaluates performance throughout the year. Monitoring can take several forms, including:

- Regular reports from the Library Director and Committees;
- Review of financial reports against Board policies;
- Review by small ad hoc committees or outside experts;
- Keeping one's eyes and ears open and observing what takes place around you by noting such things as: how the phone is answered; the apparent state of employee morale, the degree of staff or volunteer turnover.
- The annual performance evaluation of the Library Director

3. *Look Out the Window*

This means to "think creatively - dream - about the future of your organization into that better future". Board members often get bogged down in minutiae, such as developing budgets (the Director's responsibility) or involving themselves in personnel policies and similar matters (again, the Director's responsibility). Their view is directed inward rather than outward toward the communities they serve.

Moreover, too many boards are made up of people interested specifically in the organization itself, due to their specific interests. There is a real danger in any board being made up of too many of the same kinds of people. A healthy diversity is central to good creative thinking.

To spark the creative process, a board should strive for a broad community representation. Such a mix tends to foster a more outward view of the world and can promote networking with other organizations for collaborative efforts.

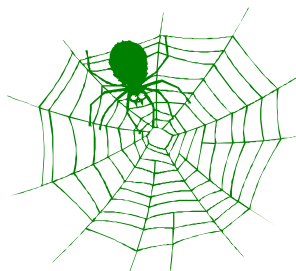
